Biographical notes of speakers, discussants, chairs

Stanimir Alexandrov focuses his practice in the areas of international dispute resolution, including investor-state arbitration and international commercial arbitration, and resolution of trade disputes before the World Trade Organization (WTO). He has advised and represented private parties and governments in arbitration before the International Centre for Settlement of Investment Disputes (ICSID), as well as in ICC, UNCITRAL and AAA international arbitrations. He has also represented governments in WTO disputes. Mr. Alexandrov is appointed to the ICSID's Panel of Arbitrators and the Panel of Conciliators. He has served as an arbitrator in investor-state disputes and appeared as expert witness in international arbitration on matters relating to the interpretation of investment treaties. He is a professorial lecturer of law at the George Washington University Law School in Washington DC, where he teaches courses on international law and dispute settlement.

Prior to engaging in private practice, Mr. Alexandrov was Vice Minister of Foreign Affairs of Bulgaria, and prior to that Deputy Chief of Mission of the Embassy of Bulgaria in Washington, D.C.. In these capacities he negotiated more than a dozen BITs, with both developed and developing countries. Mr. Alexandrov has a degree in international law from the Moscow Institute of International Relations, an LL.M. and a degree of Doctor of Juridical Science from The George Washington University Law School. In addition to English, he is fluent in French, Russian and Spanish. Mr. Alexandrov has published several books and numerous articles. His publications have been cited by parties to disputes before the International Court of Justice and by Judges of the Court.

Debapriya Bhattacharya, a macro-economist and public policy analyst, is the Executive Director of the Centre for Policy Dialogue (CPD), Bangladesh. Prior to joining CPD he worked as a Senior Research Fellow at the Bangladesh Institute of Development Studies (BIDS). He received his M.Sc. (Economics) with distinction and Ph.D. (Economics) from the Plekhanov Institute of National Economy, Moscow. Dr. Bhattacharya was a Post-doctoral Fellow at the Queen Elizabeth House, University of Oxford. He has been a Senior Fulbright Fellow at the Centre for Global Development (CGD), Washington D.C., and a Visiting Fellow at the United Nations University-Institute of New Technology, Maastricht and Department of Economics, University of Strathclyde, Glasgow. He was a Director of Janata Bank, Bangladesh's second largest commercial bank. Currently he is a member of the Advisory Committee on WTO Affairs, Ministry of Commerce, Government of Bangladesh, and a member of the governing body of BRAC - the largest NGO of the world. Dr. Bhattacharya has more than one hundred publications





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to his credit including chapters in books, monographs, journals, articles and research reports. He has contributed to the *UN LDC Report* 2000, *UNCTAD-ICC Investment Guidelines*, and *Global Competitiveness Report* 2001, 2002 and 2003 of the *World Economic Forum*.

Aaron Cosbey is an economist with a master's degree in Development Economics from Dalhousie University, Canada (*cum laude*). He specializes in the areas of trade, investment and sustainable development; international environmental governance; and climate change. He is Associate and Senior Advisor with the Trade & Investment program, and Associate with the Climate Change and Energy program at the International Institute for Sustainable Development. He has published widely for over 15 years in the area of trade and sustainable development, and more recently in the area of climate change and energy. Aaron currently serves on International Trade Canada's Market Access Advisory Group, advising the government on the Doha Round negotiations. He has served as a Member of the Canadian Deputy Minister for International Trade's Academic Advisory Council on Canadian Trade Policy, and of the Canadian Minister for International Trade's Environmental Sectoral Advisory Group on International Trade.

Juan Falconi holds Ecuadorian citizenship and is a professional economist. He obtained his Doctorate in Economics at the University of Paris, France (1983). He worked in the Statistics and National Accounts Division of the Central Bank of Ecuador (1972-2000). He was in charge of Negotiations on Services in Ecuador and the Andean Community (2000-2007). He has published several papers on economic theory and policies.

Ann Florini is Visiting Professor and Director of the Centre on Asia and Globalization at the Lee Kuan Yew School of Public Policy at the National University of Singapore. She is also Senior Fellow in the Foreign Policy Studies Program at the Brookings Institution in Washington, DC. She is internationally recognized as an authority on new approaches to global governance, focusing on the roles of civil society and the private sector in addressing global issues. Currently, she is examining governance in the energy sector. Her publications include *The Right to Know: Transparency for an Open World* (Columbia University Press, May 2007); *The Coming Democracy: New Rules for Running a New World* (Island Press, 2003/Brookings Press 2005); and *The Third Force: The Rise of Transnational Civil Society* (Carnegie Endowment for International Peace/Japan Center for International Exchange, 2000). Dr. Florini received her Ph.D. in political science from UCLA and a Master's in Public Affairs from Princeton University.

Shreekant Gupta is visiting the Institute of South Asian Studies and NUS on leave from the Delhi School of Economics, University of Delhi where he is Reader (Associate Professor). He has worked as a policymaker and researcher in various areas spanning urban policy, energy, environment, and economics over the last 25 years. Most recently he was Director (in the rank of Additional Secretary to the Government of India), National Institute of Urban Affairs at New









Delhi, where he played an important role in implementation of the federal government's ambitious 7 year, US\$12 billion urban renewal programme, the Jawaharlal Nehru Urban Renewal Mission. He also led a team that rewrote the master plan for the city of Delhi. Dr. Gupta has a doctorate in economics from the University of Maryland at College Park, and a masters degree from the Delhi School of Economics. He was Fulbright Fellow at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology (2001-2002), and Shastri Fellow at Queens University, Canada (summer 2001). He has served on several national and international committees including the Task Force to Evaluate Market-Based Instruments for Pollution Abatement, Ministry of Environment and Forests, Government of India, the Economic Options Committee of the Montreal Protocol, United Nations Environment Program (UNEP) and the Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change (IPCC).

Darryl Jarvis is Associate Professor of Political Science in Lee Kuan Yew School of Public Policy, National University of Singapore. His research and teaching interests focus on international and political risk, and the political economy of investment into Asia. Prior to joining NUS he was Senior Lecturer in the Faculty of Economics and Business at University of Sydney, Australia, where he was also the foundation Director for the Centre for International Risk, a joint enterprise between the University of Sydney, University of South Australia, and the Center for Risk Research at Shiga University, Japan.

Makhdoom Ali Khan is a senior advocate of the Supreme Court of Pakistan and was the Attorney General for Pakistan from 2001 till July 2006. He has advised Pakistan and appeared for it in its cases before ICSID tribunals and was extensively involved in BIT negotiations between the Government of Pakistan and other countries.

Vilawan Mangklatanakul received an LLB from Thammasat University, Thailand before completing her LLM and PhD studies at the University of London. Her thesis relates to a comparative evaluation of the legal environment for the promotion and protection of FDI in Malaysia and Thailand. She currently holds a position of Counsellor at the Department of International Economic Affairs, Ministry of Foreign Affairs of Thailand, where she participates as legal adviser and negotiator in the negotiation of investment chapters of a number of free trade agreements, for instance, JTEPA, Thailand-India FTA. She also holds a position of Associate Judge at the Central Intellectual Property and International Trade Court of Thailand.

Mahnaz Malik obtained her B.A. (Hons) and M.A in law from Cambridge University, after which she was admitted to practice law in New York, England & Wales and Pakistan. Before joining IISD, Ms. Malik advised companies and governments at international law firm Simmons & Simmons' London and Hong Kong offices. She has advised on arbitrations conducted under the auspices of leading international arbitral institutions such as the LCIA, ICC and ICSID. She has advised governments and NGOs in relation to investment policy and international





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conventions, and regularly publishes and speaks on these issues. Ms. Malik single-handedly organised a landmark conference in collaboration with the American Bar Association and the New York State Bar Association to provide developing countries advice on investment agreements. Her recent experience includes advising on a proposed bilateral investment treaty between the US and a South Asian state; negotiations with respect to a regional investment agreement involving 20 Southern and Eastern African states and providing an opinion to a Central Asian country on its model investment treaty. Ms. Malik is a member of the ICC Commissions on Arbitration and Anti-Corruption, and was recently listed as a "Leadership Maker" in Asian Legal Business's 100 Hot Lawyers 2005.

Howard Mann is the Senior International Law Advisor for the International Institute for Sustainable Development, and is based in Ottawa, Canada. He has been active on international investment law issues since he was an international lawyer with the Government of Canada in 1992, and now leads IISD's Investment and Sustainable Development program area. Howard has published numerous articles on issues related to investment law and sustainable development, and was lead author of IISD's 2005 Model International Agreement on Investment for Sustainable Development, the leading comprehensive alternative model agreement in the field. Howard was previously an international lawyer for the Government of Canada and participated in many international negotiations in that capacity, including on climate change and the NAFTA environmental agreement. Howard received his law degree from McGill University and has an LL.M. and Ph.D from the London School of Economics. He has taught at the University of Ottawa Law School and continues to lecture at conferences in all parts of the world on investment law and sustainable development issues.

Karen Mills is a member of the Bar of the State of New York and has practiced in Indonesia for almost 25 years, specialising primarily in oil, gas & energy, financing and general cross border transactions, in which capacity she represents many multinational clients as well as major state-owned companies. Ms. Mills is a Chartered Arbitrator and Fellow of the CIArb and other Asian institutes, founded and Co-Chairs the Indonesia Chapter of CIArb and is on the panel of arbitrators of most arbitral institutions in the region, including SIArb, Indonesia's BANI, HKIAC, PDRCI, KLRCA, CIETAC, ADNDRC and others. With over 100 papers published in professional journals and books, Ms. Mills often sits as arbitrator or mediator, and teaches all manner of CIArb courses in the region and elsewhere. Ms. Mills is a founding member of the KarimSyah law firm in Jakarta.

Alejandro Faya-Rodriguez is an attorney and counselor-at-law duly admitted to practice law in Mexico. He has a First Degree in Law from the *Universidad Iberoamericana* Law School (Mexico), a *Magister Juris* degree from the University of Oxford (England), and a Master Degree in Public Policy from the *Facultad Latinoamericana de Ciencias Sociales* (Mexico). He also has attended courses of Public and Private International Law at the Hague Academy of International





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Law. Mr. Faya has worked in prestigious law firms of Mexico City, in corporate and commercial matters, foreign investment projects, international business transactions, arbitration and energy. Mr. Faya is Deputy Director-General for International Affairs, of the Directorate-General of Foreign Investment, at the Ministry of Economy. In that capacity, he is chief negotiator of all investment treaties negotiated by Mexico, as well as counsel for investment policy issues before international organizations and within the Government. He has negotiated several agreements now in force with countries from Asia, Europe and Latin America.

Mr. Faya is a professor of law at both graduate and undergraduate levels, in the *Universidad Iberoamericana* Law School and in the *Universidad Nacional Autonoma de Mexico* Graduate Law Division, where he teaches foreign investment law and treaty law. Also Mr. Faya delivers on a regular basis, in Mexico and abroad, seminars and lectures on subjects related to his areas of expertise; he also has several publications, including legal papers and journalistic articles.

John Savage is a partner of the law firm of Shearman & Sterling LLP. He leads the firm's international arbitration practice in Asia, and is co-managing partner of the firm's Singapore office. John has represented governments and corporations in over 70 international arbitrations, under the auspices of numerous institutions worldwide, including ICSID, the ICC, the LCIA and the SIAC. These include investor and state representations in nine ICSID investment treaty arbitrations. John has also been appointed chairman, sole arbitrator and coarbitrator in ICSID, ICC, KLRCA and SIAC arbitrations. In addition, John has advised government representatives in Asia on the negotiation and drafting of bilateral investment treaties. John's publications include two in-depth articles on the development of investment treaties and investment treaty arbitration in Asia. He is also the co-editor of "Fouchard, Gaillard, Goldman on International Commercial Arbitration".

M Sornarajah LLM (Yale) PhD, LLD (London) is C.J. Koh Professor of Law at the Faculty of Law of the National University of Singapore. He was previously Head of the Law School of the University of Tasmania, Australia. He was Research Fellow at the Centre for International Law, Cambridge and at the Max Planck *Institut fur Offentliches Auslandisches Recht* at Heidelburg, Germany. He was International Law Fellow and Visiting Professor at American University at Washington DC. He is Professorial Fellow at the Centre for Petroleum and Natural Resources Law at the University of Dundee, Scotland. He is Visiting Professor at the World Trade Institute of the Universities of Berne and Neuchatel, Switzerland.

He is the author of <u>The Pursuit of Nationalized Property</u> (Martinus Nijhoff, The Hague, 1986); <u>International Commercial Arbitration</u> (Longman, 1992); <u>The Law of International Joint Ventures</u> (Longman, 1994); <u>The International Law on Foreign Investment</u> (Cambridge University Press, 1996, 2nd ed., 2004) and <u>The Settlement of Foreign Investment Disputes</u> (2001). He was the Director of the UNCTAD/WTO Programme on Investment Treaties, Pretoria and New Delhi. He is a Fellow of the Australian Centre for International Commercial Arbitration and is on the





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Regional Panel of the Singapore International Arbitration Centre. He has been arbitrator or counsel in several leading arbitrations and has published extensively in the area of international commercial arbitration, public international law and international investment law. He was, recently, expert counsel for Argentina in *El Paso v The Republic of Argentina*.

Pilar Victoria Cerón Zapata is an attorney at law, with a Postgraduate and Masters –LLM – degree in Private & Corporate Law from Pontificia Bolivariana University, Colombia. She has been a full time University professor, researcher and bilingual consultant in various Universities in Colombia (EAFIT University, Medellín; and Rosario University, Bogotá) and has carried out investment research projects at McGill University, Canada, (sponsored by the Canadian Government) and in Lancaster University in the United Kingdom. As a result of these research activities she has published several papers in local refereed magazines. Currently, Ms. Pilar Cerón works for the Colombian Government, as an Investment Negotiator in the Ministry of Trade, Industry and Tourism of Colombia and has dealt with several negotiations of International Agreements (Both BIT negotiations and Investment Chapters of Trade Agreements).
